Course Description. Suicide rates remain high in the U.S., while emerging risk factors and inconsistent use of evidence-based interventions create gaps in clinical safety. This activity equips clinicians with up-to-date knowledge of current epidemiology, evolving psychosocial risks, and validated suicide-prevention practices. Participants will strengthen their skills in structured assessment, collaborative safety planning, lethal means counseling, and system-level prevention strategies to improve patient safety and care continuity.

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Learning Objectives

- Describe current national suicide epidemiology and emerging psychosocial risk drivers, including economic and technological disruption.
- Differentiate evidence-based safety planning from no-suicide contracts and implement the Stanley-Brown Safety Planning Intervention using a structured, collaborative approach.
- Apply lethal means counseling and digital risk mitigation strategies within outpatient suicide risk management.
- Identify when safety planning alone is insufficient and explain how rapid-acting and system-level approaches can be integrated into comprehensive suicide prevention care.
